
About the Speakers and Moderators:

Marion Nestle is Paulette Goddard Professor of Nutrition, Food Studies, and Public Health, emerita, at New York University in the department she chaired from 1988-2003. She earned a Ph.D. in molecular biology and an M.P.H. in public health nutrition

from the University of California, Berkeley. She writes books about food politics, most recently, <u>Slow Cooked:</u> <u>An Unexpected Life in Food Politics.</u> She blogs almost daily at <u>foodpolitics.com</u>, where she also posts information about her books, other publications, and lectures.



Robert Gottlieb is Professor Emeritus of Urban and Environmental Policy and the Founder and Former Director of the Urban & Environmental Policy Institute at Occidental College. He is the author and coauthor of fourteen books,

including Food Justice and his most recent book, <u>Care-Centered Politics</u>: <u>From the Home to the Planet</u>. Professor Gottlieb is the co-editor of two MIT Press series, "Urban and Industrial Environments" and "Food, Health, and Environment," and has been a long-time food and environmental justice researcher and activist.
